REGIE ROUTMAN has more than fortyfive years of experience teaching and working in diverse, under-performing schools and classrooms across the U.S. and Canada as an educational leader. mentor teacher, literacy coach. classroom teacher, and teacher of students with learning differences. Her many research-based books and resources have supported hundreds of thousands of teachers, principals, and educators at all levels to create and sustain trusting, intellectual school cultures where hearing all the voices, ongoing professional learning, and equity for all learners are priorities.

Her first book, Transitions: From Literature to Literacy (Heinemann, 1988) was the first book by an American teacher to adapt and apply the highly successful literacy and language practices from New Zealand and Australia to U.S. schools. Recognizing the need for teachers and principals to "see," analyze, and be coached in the effective moves and language of responsive teaching, in the 1990's Regie created a unique, week long Residency Model where she worked side-by-side with teachers and administrators demonstrating principled practices to raise and sustain literacy achievement and create a joyful, collaborative learning culture.

AM01 - Transforming our Teaching: Classrooms in Action Presenter: Allyson Matczuk, Ph.D.	With videos, photos, and conversations with teachers and students, we will see the Read-Write connection in action. What does it look like in sound like when students' hearts and minds are fully engaged and learning? We will observe Centennial School in Selkirk, MB at work. Suitable for: K-5
AM02 - Indigenous Literacy Responsiveness Presenter: Gloria Sinclair	This session will address aspects of literacy through a lens of indigeneity with understandings pertaining to context, nonverbal cues, silences/pauses, along with subconscious knowledge. This workshop session is reflected within Indigenous sources of information (msv) to support the path to literacy learning. Suitable for: K-5
AMO3 & PMO3- Awakening the Heart and Mind Through Poetry Presenter: Debra Crouch	Why poetry, you might ask? This session will explore how to create a community that reads and writes with joy and ease in this heart centred genre. Come learn how poetry serves as an entrance to all reading and writing. Suitable for: K-5
AMO4 - Teacher Expertise in Selecting Texts for Early Readers Presenter: Susan Vincent	Selecting texts for early readers has become a hot topic. Teachers need to be expert choosers of their instructional texts with knowledge of various book types, including leveled, decodable, and patterned. We will explore what the research actually tells us, as we dive into how to select the best texts for scaffolding our students' needs in early reading. Topics include types of early books, selection criteria from research, and honoring teachers as professional decision-makers. Suitable for: K-2, supporting beginning/struggling readers.

Recently 'retired' Allyson has worked at all grade levels and in special education in the Manitoba public school system. She has been an intermittent sessional instructor in Language and Literacy at the University of Manitoba, Early Literacy and Intervention Consultant for Manitoba Education and a Reading Recovery Trainer. She continues to be a regular presenter at literacy conferences and supports teachers and schools through her ongoing work in the "Transforming our Teaching Through Reading/Writing Connections" professional development project. Allyson is the current President of the Reading Recovery Council of North America.

Gloria D. Sinclair is from the Peguis First Nation and carries her indigeneity with pride, along with the belief of responsibility to acknowledge and share indigenous ways of being. Gloria has more than 30 years of experience teaching, facilitating and training in various capacities. A trained Reading Recovery Teacher Leader (Emerita) and literacy project writer for several projects including one of the initial contract writers in the conception of the Manitoba First Nations Education Resource Centre (MFNERC). Gloria is known to be a valuable resource to classroom teachers in various Manitoba First Nation Schools and in training teachers in Reading Recovery, which is demonstrated in her comprehensive knowledge in literacy processing and assessment, along with the supports she provided both in the classroom and in workshop facilitation.

Debra Crouch has more than 30 years of experience teaching and coaching in schools and classrooms across the U.S. and Mexico, supporting educators to make instructional decisions that matter for learners. She has been a classroom teacher, author, coach, conference speaker, and literacy consultant. Debra has developed a multi-grade video series to support Shared and Guided Reading, demonstrating multiple lessons with students to consider how instruction evolves over time. Presenter: Lola Whonnock PMO4 -Mamàhtawisiwin: The Wonder We Are Born With Lola was born and raised in British Columbia. She is of the Kwakwaka'wakw First Nations, an intergenerational survivor of Indian residential schools and the 60's Scoop. She completed her Bachelor of Education with the Native Indian Teacher Education Program at the University of British Columbia in 1997 and began a teaching career among the Nisga'a School District in northwestern British Columbia. In 2002, Lola completed a Master of Education at UBC focusing on First Nations education and staff retention. In 2013, she resettled in Winnipeg, where she worked as a teacher for both youth and adults. She has taught in English, French, Nisga'a, and Anishinaabemowin. From 2018 to just prior to joining the Indigenous Excellence, Lola worked at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights where she created and delivered original education programs for learners, led staff training and helped maintain strong connections to educational, Indigenous, and artistic community groups.
