To their credit, all but one candidate responded to the questions, sharing everything from what they feel qualifies them to sit on the school board to what their priorities would be once elected. They also share how, if at all, they would tangibly commit to healing and meaningful Reconciliation in a community that has been deeply hurt—betrayed, in fact, by folks they had trusted to build a public education system that values, inspires and safeguards each and every student in the division.

Each candidate has a vision for your community's schools.

How about you? Do you have a vision for your children's education? Who among the candidates best represents what you want for Mountain View students, and for your community? The Herald Q+A may just help you decide.

So, as we enter the final two weeks of the campaign, reach out to your candidates and ask questions. Their contact information is included in the Q+A.
